

# CENTER FOR CONTEMPORARY ARTS THANKS COMMUNITY ON MAY 21 WITH FREE DAY OF FILMS

Full day of CCA's most popular movies with free admission as "thank you" for community donations to save CCA Cinemas

**Santa Fe, NM, May 17, 2023** – The Center for Contemporary Arts will offer free admission to all films screening in both cinemas on May 21 to thank the community for its overwhelming support this month to save the CCA Cinemas.

According to Paul Barnes, the volunteer CCA Cinemas General Manager, "The community raised over \$300,000 to keep the CCA Cinemas in a grassroots fundraising effort in less than two weeks! To thank the donors and supporters and everyone else in Santa Fe, I've decided to offer free admission to the CCA Cinemas on Sunday, May 21."

Barnes has will offer a full day of films in each of CCA's two screening rooms. "I've selected films that have been major hits at the CCA Cinemas over the past few years – movies that Santa Fe residents talk about with love and admiration. Many played here for weeks and weeks, and really helped to establish CCA's reputation."

### **Dying to Know: Ram Dass and Timothy Leary** (USA, 2014)

Directed by Gay Dillingham, Edited by David Leach – both Santa Fe residents. Two conventional Harvard professors began probing the edges of consciousness in the '60s, while developing an epic intimate friendship. They both saw themselves as adventurers exploring alternate realities, and hearing where they ended up is a trip all by itself. Timothy Leary ended up in jail, while Richard Alpert became Ram Dass, a spiritual teacher, author of the renowned *Be Here Now*.

# Beasts of the Southern Wild (USA, 2012)

Sometimes miraculous films come into being, made by people you've never heard of, starring unknown faces, blindsiding you with creative genius. *Beasts of the Southern Wild* is one of those films. It tells the tale of six-year-old Hushpuppy and her father, Wink living together in a desolate wilderness of poverty called the Bathtub struggling to survive. A surprise hit of 2012, it was nominated for four Academy Awards including for Quvenzhane Wallis, who at age 9 became the youngest Best Actress nominee in history and one of the most memorable of movie heroines.

### **Buck** (USA, 2011)

A 2011 American documentary film directed by Cindy Meehl, Buck is an examination of the life of acclaimed "horse whisperer" Buck Brannaman, who recovered from years of child abuse to become a well-known expert in the interactions between horses and people. Buck played at CCA for what seemed like forever and is still talked about by Santa Fe residents with awe as one of their favorite films.

## Parasite (South Korea, 2019)

A zeitgeist-defining sensation that distilled a global reckoning over class inequality into a tour de force of pop-cinema subversion, Bong Joon Ho's genre-scrambling black-comic thriller confirms his status as one of the world's foremost filmmakers. Parasite was the first non-English-language film to win the Academy Award for Best Picture.

## Moonlight (USA, 2016)

As tender as it is tough as it is true, this three-tiered coming-of-age drama *Moonlight* is a master class character study that reaches vaunted heights of emotion. Director Barry Jenkins chronicles the childhood, adolescence and burgeoning adulthood of a young, African-American, gay man growing up in a rough neighborhood of Miami. Winner of the Academy Award for Best Picture.

## **The Rider** (USA, 2017)

Director Chloe Zhao's *The Rider*, is the kind of rare work that seems to attain greatness through an almost alchemical fusion of nominal opposites. An account of rodeo riders on a South Dakota reservation, it is so fact-based that it almost qualifies as a documentary. Yet the film's style, its sense of light and landscape and mood, simultaneously give it the mesmerizing force of the most confident cinematic poetry. The film is a deft fictional adaptation of the real-life story of Brady Jandreau and his family struggling to deal with Brady's traumatic head injury from a bronco riding accident. Though fiction, Zhao cast the real Jandreau family as her characters.

#### 7:00pm (CCA Studio Cinema)

#### **El Norte** (USA-UK, 1983)

Until director Gregory Nava's groundbreaking *El Norte*, the personal travails of immigrants crossing the border to America had never been shown in the movies with such urgent humanism. A work of social realism imbued with dreamlike imagery, El Norte is a lovingly rendered, heartbreaking story of hope and survival, which critic Roger Ebert called "a Grapes of Wrath for our time."

#### Kovaanisqatsi (USA, 1983)

Directed by the legendary Santa Fe resident Godfrey Reggio, Koyaanisqatsi is a groundbreaking work in every way and caused a sensation when it was released in 1983. This first work of The Qatsi Trilogy wordlessly surveys the rapidly changing environments of the Northern Hemisphere, in an astonishing collage created by the director, cinematographer Ron Fricke, and composer Philip Glass. It shuttles viewers from one jaw-dropping vision to the next, moving from images of untouched nature to others depicting human beings' increasing dependence on technology. Koyaanisqatsi's unique methods (including hypnotic time-lapse photography) make it a look at our world from a truly visionary angle.
